Little, Jean, 1932-. Hey world, here I am! 1st Harper Trophy ed. [New York] : HarperTrophy, 1990. A collection of poems and brief vignettes from the perspective of a girl named Kate Bloomfield, reflecting her views on friendship, school, family life, and the world.

Ackerman, Karen, 1951-. Song and dance man. New York : Knopf :, c1988. Grandpa demonstrates for his visiting grandchildren some of the songs, dances, and jokes he performed when he was a vaudeville entertainer.

Bang, Molly. When Sophie gets angry-- really, really angry-- 1st bookshelf ed. New York : Scholastic, 2004, c1999. A young girl is upset and doesn't know how to manage her anger but takes the time to cool off and regain her composure.

Bunting, Eve, 1928-. The memory string. New York : Clarion Books, c2000. While still grieving for her mother and unable to accept her stepmother, a girl clings to the memories represented by forty-three buttons on a string.

Fox, Mem, 1946-. Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge. 1st American ed. Brooklyn, N.Y. : Kane/Miller Book Publishers, 1989, c1985. A small boy tries to discover the meaning of "memory" so he can restore that of an elderly friend.

Hills, Tad. How Rocket learned to read. 1st ed. New York : Schwartz & Wade Books, c2010. A little yellow bird teaches Rocket the dog how to read by first introducing him to the alphabet.

Heide, Florence Parry. The day of Ahmed's secret. New York : Mulberry Paperback Book, 1995. As Ahmed travels the streets of Cairo with his cart of butane cannisters, he harbors a secret he can't wait to tell.

Hoberman, Mary Ann. A house is a house for me. New York : Puffin Books, 2007. Lists in rhyme the dwellings of various animals and things.

Howard, Elizabeth Fitzgerald. Aunt Flossie's hats : (and crab cakes later). New York : Clarion Books, c1991. Sarah and Susan share tea, cookies, crab cakes, and stories about hats when they visit their favorite relative, Aunt Flossie.

Howard, Elizabeth Fitzgerald. Virgie goes to school with us boys. 1st ed. New York : Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers, c2000. In the post-Civil War South, a young African American girl is determined to prove that she can go to school just like her older brothers.

Johnson, Donald B. Henry hikes to Fitchburg. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, 2000. While his friend works hard to earn the train fare to Fitchburg, young Henry Thoreau walks the thirty miles through woods and fields, enjoying nature.

Lionni, Leo, 1910-. Fish is fish. New York, : Pantheon Books, [1970]. When his friend, the tadpole, becomes a frog and leaves the pond to explore the world, the little fish decides that maybe he doesn't have to remain in the pond either.

Lionni, Leo, 1910-1999. Frederick. New York : Pantheon, 1967. Frederick, the poet mouse, stores up something special for the long, cold winter.

Muth, Jon J. Zen shorts. 1st ed. New York : Scholastic Press, 2005. When Stillwater the bear moves into the neighborhood, the stories he tells to three siblings teach them to look at the world in new ways.

Polacco, Patricia. The bee tree. New York : Philomel Books, c1993. To teach his granddaughter the value of books, a grandfather leads a growing crowd in search of the tree where the bees keep all their honey.

Polacco, Patricia. Mrs. Katz and Tush. New York : a Bantam Little Rooster Book, c1992. A long-lasting friendship develops between Larnel, a young African-American, and Mrs. Katz, a lonely, Jewish widow, when Larnel presents Mrs. Katz with a scrawny kitten without a tail.

Polacco, Patricia. Thank you, Mr. Falker. New York : Philomel Books, c1998. At first, Trisha loves school, but her difficulty learning to read makes her feel dumb, until, in the fifth grade, a new teacher helps her understand and overcome her problem.

Say, Allen. Grandfather's journey. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, c1993. A Japanese American man recounts his grandfather's journey to America, which he later also undertakes, and the feelings of being torn by a love for two different countries.

Thurber, James, 1894-1961. Many moons. San Diego : Voyager Books/Harcourt Brace, 1971, c1943. Though many try, only the court jester is able to fulfill Princess Lenore's wish for the moon.

Cooney, Barbara, 1917-. Miss Rumphius. 1st ed. New York : Viking Press, [1982]. As a child Great-aunt Alice Rumphius resolved that when she grew up she would go to faraway places, live by the sea in her old age, and do something to make the world more beautiful--and she does all those things, the last being the most difficult of all.

Creech, Sharon. Love that dog. New York : Joanna Cotler Books, c2001. A young student, who comes to love poetry through a personal understanding of what different famous poems mean to him, surprises himself by writing his own inspired poem.

Creech, Sharon. Walk two moons. New York : HarperCollins, c1994. After her mother leaves home suddenly, thirteen-year-old Sal and her grandparents take a car trip retracing her mother's route. Along the way, Sal recounts the story of her friend Phoebe, whose mother also left.

DiCamillo, Kate. Flora & Ulysses : the illuminated adventures. 1st ed. Somerville, Mass. : Candlewick Press, 2013. A girl named Flora and a squirrel named Ulysses, whose life was saved by Flora after he was involved in an incident with a vacuum cleaner, team up to use Ulysses' superpowers to conquer villains and protect the weak.
